Program Overview: The concept of “network neutrality” has perhaps become the central sticking point in efforts to overhaul U.S. telecommunications laws. While the debate is rich in political rhetoric, policymakers need to understand the potential unintended consequences that network neutrality legislation would have on competition and industry structure. To examine this important issue in more detail, the Phoenix Center will conduct an interactive workshop to present our recent empirical research on network neutrality, including:
